

Adopted FY 2023 Budget

\$1.5B Budget 7.6% increase over FY 2022

Overview



- 3.4% growth in real estate property assessments
- 7.8% growth in overall tax revenue
- Revenues rebounding but not yet at prepandemic levels

Personal Property Tax Relief

In response to surge in vehicle valuations directly related to supply chain issues & rising market prices:

- Adjusting the assessment ratio to 88% of a car's value
- Elimination of regressive \$33 Motor Vehicle Fee

Applying an equity lens to budget priorities and decisions.

Commitment to Workforce



With a competitive labor market & inflation, the budget includes:

- 5.25% merit increase for general emplovees
- 8.5% merit increase for uniform Fire and Sheriff's Office
- 13.5% merit increase for uniform staff in Police Dept.
- \$1.5M to address pay compression
- **Increases** to some premium pays
- Additional funding for employee bonuses, including targeted retention, referral and signing bonuses

Affordable Housing



prevention, housing support & supply

- \$18.7M added to Affordable Housing Investment Fund (AHIF)
- \$14.3M for housing grants
- \$588K added (\$3.7M total) in local funding for permanent supportive housing
- \$23M in federal funding for housing choice vouchers
- \$150K to perform 1,200 inspections of committed affordable housing units (CAFs)
- +2.0 FTEs in added capacity for compliance & housing development

\$4.65M in Climate Change **Investments**

Highlights:

- \$250K for FTES to create Office of Climate Coordination and Policy
- \$1M for Arlington CEP Action **Fund**
- \$490K for County energy efficiency projects & assessments
- \$413K to advance Community **Energy Plan**
- \$300K to support a Zero Waste
- \$738K for electrification of County vehicle fleet
- \$139K to support solar panel installation at County facilities

Schools

\$584.4M to APS, increase of \$54.5M
