## HALRB Meeting January 17, 2024, CoA 23-20A

- **5620 3<sup>rd</sup> Street N.:** Request to amend CoA 23-20 regarding three historic plaques.

December 14, 2023

To Whom it May Concern:

On October 28, 2023, the Arlington Historical Society (AHS) and Black Heritage Museum of Arlington dedicated the first three “stumbling stones” or plaques to honor the lives of the enslaved people who lived and toiled at the Ball-Sellers House. Before the dedication, plans for the plaques were submitted to the HALRB for review and a CoA was provided on August 16, 2023.

After the dedication, Cynthia Liccese-Torres, informed the Arlington Historical Society that it would need to submit a new CoA request because of the existence of a stamp on the rear of the concrete plinths that hold the plaques. The stamp has the names of the organizations responsible for creating the markers and the date of their dedication and the AHS logo. It reads: “Arlington Historical Society, Black Heritage Museum, Arlington Tech, 10/28/23.” Students from Arlington Tech placed the school’s name on the plaques as students from the high school manufactured the plinths and created the plaques. AHS did not know that they would put their name on the marker or the AHS logo (a drawing of AHS Museum), but does not object. Liccese-Torres felt the Society should have informed HALRB that a stamp would be placed on the markers before receiving the first CoA. While this is not disputed, in all honesty, this did not occur to the Society. No harm was meant by its exclusion.

Another issue brought to the attention of AHS was the absence of the Sankofa symbol on the bronze plaque. AHS and the Black Heritage Museum decided to forgo the symbol after receiving the original CoA. We decided it would detract from the rawness of just having the enslaved person’s name and vital information.

The Arlington Historical Society asks HALRB to provide a new CoA that takes into account the stamp on the back of each of the three cement plinths and the lack of the Sankofa symbol.

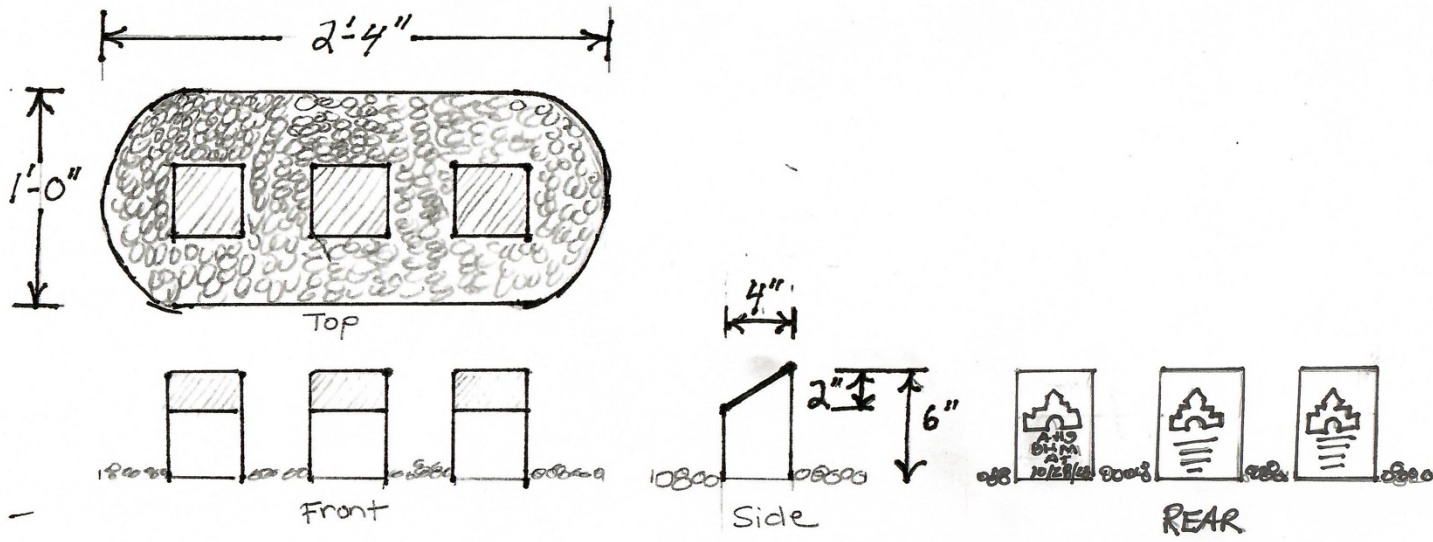

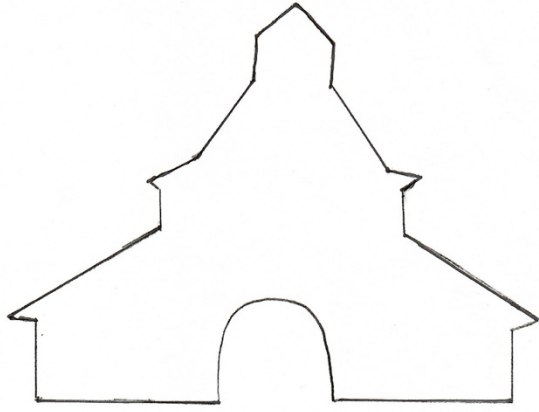
