

Robert Ball Sr. Family Burial Ground

The nineteenth century Robert Ball Sr. Family Burial Ground held the graves of members of the Ball family, interred between 1854 to 1881. The burial ground serves as a reminder of the Ball family, namesake of Ballston, and Arlington County's rural past.

Known Burials

Alice Ball (1853-1854), daughter of Robert Ball Jr. & Elizabeth Ann (nee McElwee) Ball

Robert Ball Sr. (1776-1861)

Ann (nee Thrift) Ball (1781-1864), wife of Robert Ball Sr. James Thrift Ball (1806-1867), son of Robert Ball Sr. & Ann Ball

Mary (nee Sewell) Ball (1800-1870), wife of James T. Ball

Francis E. Dyer (1843-1881), grandson of Robert Ball Sr. & Ann Ball, son of William B. Dyer & Ellen (nee Ball) Dyer

During construction of a new church in 1923, and possibly before, markers may have been moved.

1854

Robert Ball Sr. set aside a ¼-acre plot north of his house as a burial ground when his 1-year-old granddaughter, Alice Ball, died in 1854.

1881

Francis E. Dyer, grandson of Robert Ball Sr. and Ann Ball, passed away and was the last known person to be buried here.

1923

The 1923 church replaced the 1906 building, and by the early twentieth century, grave markers were clustered to the east.

2024

Ballston Station was completed as a mixed-use project with 144 affordable apartments co-located with a church and community service center.

1861

Robert Ball Sr. died and was buried in the family burial ground.

1906

The Ball family conveyed the burial ground to the Methodist Episcopal Church South for construction of a church.

2017

Arlington County Board designated the Robert Ball Sr. Family Burial Ground as a Local Historic District.
