


The Green Valley community has a long and diverse history beginning in 1719 and has evolved over the years with the land acquisition of Levi and Sarah Ann Jones, free Africans who purchased 14 acres in 1844. Fort Barnard, established during the Civil War, provided jobs. Lomax AME Zion Church, originating around 1865, played a vital role in education. Housing accommodations, recreational facilities and economic opportunities within Green Valley held its African American residents together during racial segregation.

Despite these challenges, Green Valley takes pride in its heritage, which also includes the rise of Green Valley Pharmacy in 1952 and the existence of the Dr. Charles R. Drew Elementary School and Jennie Dean Park. Green Valley continues to evolve. It stands on sacred ground, rooted in migration, diversity, prosperity, and growth, embodying themes of oppression, freedom, adversity, resilience, setbacks, perseverance, and ingenuity. Green Valley, historically a gateway for freed Africans, stands at the threshold of a new era.
