Simply put, Approval voting (vote for all you approve of, most votes wins) is simpler elimination and transfer and better than Ranked Choice voting. RCV steps will be difficult to is touted as fixing the "spoiler effect", but only mitigates it. This can be seen in the most recent Alaska congressional election in which Palin spoiled the election for Begich. That is, between Begich and Peltola, more Alaskans preferred Begich, but Palin caused him to be eliminated. Approval voting does not have this issue, because all dis/approvals are taken into account simultaneously. Approval voting is also much simpler to implement, because the ballots are effectively the same as existing one. Thanks to this the vast majority of voting machines already support Approval voting.
