

Moreover, the county's vague at best sound mitigation plans are a slap in the face to nearby residents who will be heavily impacted from poorly considered / poorly funded sound mitigation plans. The county needs to find a non-residential location to build 12+ courts so that pickleball can be moved out of residential neighborhoods as is occurring all across the country. Finally, PB courts should not be operated from sunrise to 10pm at any location in residential neighborhoods. Facility operation should be limited to operating hours of the community center at most.

I would suggest a 3' break in the divider fencing center at the net posts. This allows instructors and court monitors (tournaments) to easily flow from court to court when instructing or monitor more than one court. The 3' opening centered will rarely allow a ball to interrupt a neighboring game.

Each court should be 7' from a divider fence (not 5'). Today's players are younger and more athletic and need more runoff space. If it is not possible to add additional space to the footprint, eliminate the court divider fences. I would rather ask a player on another court to return my ball than crash into a fence trying to return a ball.

Increase the distance from sidelines to the perimeter fence to 7' for the same reasons.

A centrally located shaded seating area is preferred because it spreads out players waiting to play behind the courts rather than bunched up along the sidelines of two courts.

Thanks for widening the walkway to accommodate wheelchairs. FYI - the recommended total playing area for wheelchair play is 44' x 74'. Eliminating the divider fences will help to make the courts more wheelchair friendly.

The county also offers Pickleball lessons, encouraging new players. Where will all these new players be able to play if you reduce the courts. I believe the County is being shortsighted and responding to a vocal minority of neighbors without fully considering the large numbers of players who use these facilities every day when developing a solution to the very real issues trying to be addressed with this project. Additionally, the County should consider the issue of the overall lack of pickleball courts and needs to develop a County-wide solution that will satisfy residents as well as players.

Pickleball is an extremely fast-growing sport for people of all ages, demographics, and capabilities. With its resources and generally progressive attitude towards most things, I'm really surprised that Arlington can't do a lot better than this. We need way more pickleball courts and opportunities for drop-in play (which is fairly unique to pickleball and one of its biggest drawing cards). My husband and I play pickleball a lot when we're in Florida for 3-4 months in the winter. There are all kinds of facilities with opportunities for drop-in play which is what most people prefer. It allows for more mixing of players and has the advantage of being able to "drop-in" when you want, for however long or short you want to play. It works great! Making PB courts reservation-only will be a real setback for this sport in this county. If people want to make some courts reservation-only, I would suggest either doing that where there are only a few courts (which is less attractive for drop-in programs) or designating certain times of day for reservations and other times for drop-in play. Right now, the only outdoor courts know of in Arlington that have good drop-in play are the 3 courts at WR, and it gets so ridiculously crowded that I mostly stay away and have to drive to places in Fairfax to play. PLEASE, PLEASE listen to all the pickleball players who desperately want a decent new facility in Arlington. We can do better!

1. The sound reduction measures are totally inadequate. The fences are too short to prevent straight line of sound to 2nd storey of houses and higher. However, draft concept one fundamentally fails because it would eliminate three tennis courts while providing only limited capacity (six courts) for playing pickleball. The tennis and pickleball communities would be better served by reorienting the tennis courts north-south and dual striping them to permit playing both tennis and pickleball. Both sports can be played on a tennis court. Once, however, a tennis court has been converted to a pickleball court, only pickleball can be played on it. That's why draft concept one (and the entire Walter Reed conversion project) fundamentally fails.

The idea is to get the courts' sound barriers to deflect spectator/idle player noise away from the 18th street residences and the open space along Walter Reed drive.

This concept fails to address the already difficult parking situation for residents and persons who utilize the community facility as those parking spots are always taken by pickle ball players. It also fails to address the influx this will have on the bathroom facilities and staffing at the community center. This is unfair to the local community. The project is only providing 6 pickleball courts which are mainly being used by individuals from outside of Arlington, shouldn't the \$1.5 million of taxpayer funds be used for a more meaningful and sustainable effort that encompasses the needs of the local community?

As a player, I am not as negatively affected by the popping noise because I can predict the pops on my court and other courts nearby, and I am totally focused on the game. I support the pause, but strongly recommend allowing only 2 pickleball courts during the pause, and then do another sound test once the acoustic fencing is in place. Incremental investment in pickleball courts may be the best strategy, so that the sound impacts can be tested at each stage and the county thus avoids a huge investment that turns out to be a practical mistake. I love playing outdoor pickleball, but this game has unique sound problems and the county should choose cautious, incremental investment in outdoor pickleball courts. The pause might also continue to allow the pickleball courts on the basketball court because the noise is not such a problem there. Maybe move the basketball court to one of the current tennis courts during the pause? Thus during the pause, the current tennis court pad would include 1 basketball court, 1 tennis court, and one multi-use court for 2 pickleball games.

Respectfully, the pickle ball is loud and annoying. It also takes up nearly all of the court space that had previously been used by basketball and tennis players during peak recreation times. The county should find a new, separate location to build pickle ball courts—further from residential areas, and without disrupting athletic spaces that are already plentifully used.

Arlington DPR needs to learn how to move away from a big bang delivery environment with all the time intensive upfront planning that adds to delays, that then allow a small vociferous number of residents to inflate and fabricate concerns, to the detriment of the recreational and healthy activity options available to the many. Like everything else in 2023, Arlington County and the DPR should look to a value delivery methodology that can more rapidly respond to needs and problems in a more incremental manner. Noise reduction steps (netting) should have been taken immediately to temper neighborhood complaints before they became excessive and unreasonable. No pause - get going now. The section of this survey describing a possible pause is the only part of it that makes sense to me. Residents living near Walter Reed Community Center have repeatedly pleaded with Arlington County not to repurpose the tennis courts into dedicated pickleball courts. Retaining the tennis courts would offer at least three benefits. First, it would enable tennis players to continue using the courts. Second, both tennis and pickleball could be played on the courts (unlike on dedicated pickleball courts, which can accommodate only pickleball). Third, dual-use courts actually would provide more capacity for playing pickleball compared to converting the tennis courts into six dedicated pickleball courts. In other words, retaining the tennis courts and dual striping them for pickleball would represent a win-win for players of both tennis and pickleball. However, to appease the neighboring residents and provide them reasonable relief from the noise pickleball causes, I recommend also limiting the dual-use courts' open hours to the hours during which the Community Center is open.

I go to the park everyday morning and evening. I've noticed the demand to play pickle ball has been reduced, especially in the evening the time it was the most popular. If other courts are painted in Arlington to include pickleball, maybe there is not the need to create pickleball specific courts here. If new courts are built, it would make the park more over crowded and bring in more crowds of people wanting to play.

I don't think the county should take away any current green space or park with new construction of courts.

As a tennis player, I find it unpleasant to play near pickleball courts. Tennis players rely heavily on sound cues to evaluate speed/power of opponent's stroke, Also, while there is not as much chatter during play, but the opposing players have to communicate over a greater distance than paddleball players do, which means they have to be louder just to hear each other. For this reason, I favor dedicated tennis and dedicated paddleball courts, but keep them physically separated. Note also that tennis players generally play without pause for an hour, then leave, they don't take breaks and hang around observing and commenting loudly on other games in progress. They therefore bring far less total noise to their court sites than paddleball players do. Also less strain on facility and adjacent neighborhood parking.

For the most part I agree with pausing the project and re-assessing other options within the county. However, I'm not a fan of the registration system taking hold at Walter Reed. Drop-in play at Walter Reed is one of the defining qualities about this location and has partially led to the steep increase in Pickleball's popularity in the county as a whole. Adding acoustifence and lighting to the basketball side while continuing to keep it a multi-use space (sharing with basketball players) seems like a good compromise. Pickleball gets to keep 9 courts while not pushing out the basketball players. Also, the acoustifence will help to satisfy complaints of the neighbors on both sides of the park. A survey should be taken to assess when the appropriate hours of the day should be for pickleball priority vs. basketball priority on the basketball court side of the park.

If the county truly wishes to more equitably distribute pickleball demand across the county, as DPR has indicated it seeks to accomplish, ALL county pickleball facilities should allow for "DROP-In play" (i.e., no reservations needed), otherwise WRCC's courts will remain a magnet for the vast majority of play from across the county (as well as from players coming from other VA locales, Maryland, and the District of Columbia).

The report presented to the county board by DPR on 4/25 made it VERY clear that limiting hours and locking the courts was part of its efforts to "find solutions that are measured and responsive to the community's needs and create a space that improves the user experience while balancing neighbors' concerns" and that the intent was to "Reduce impact of intense play on neighbors."

The proximity of housing near Walter Reed (less than 90' as per the county's presentation of 5/23), is what makes all of the difference here. Due to how close nearby residents are to the courts, the impact of PB noise will be significantly greater here than on the residences near the newly striped sites, especially in the early morning and later in the evening, and as such needs to be factored into the hours of operation of these courts / why continuing to limit the hours to those of the operation of the community center make good sense.

Likewise, please reconsider the decision to stripe pickleball lines on the tennis hitting wall at Virginia Highlands Park. The Virginia Highlands basketball court (not the tennis hitting wall) received a 5 in the Outdoor Courts Assessment results. The space at the tennis hitting wall does not meet the 30' x 60' recommended minimum space for a pickleball court. There is only 5' from a baseline to a solid wall and to the perimeter fence on the other side. The recommended minimum space behind a baseline is 8'. Running backwards into a solid wall will cause injuries and may generate law suits against the county. One DPR staff person said those courts will be used by recreational pickleball players. That is even more of a safety concern because they are "only" recreational players. We can do better Arlington County! Please do not stripe the tennis hitting wall space. Instead, why not stripe one of the Virginia Highlands tennis courts for two pickleball courts? It's time for tennis players to share their courts. Pickleball is here to stay. We want to be proud of our courts and ensure that they will be used. Creating pickleball courts on space that does not meet the recommended minimum amount of space is an insult to players. Would DPR create a tennis court that does not meet the recommended minimum space? Please respect our game by providing courts that meet or preferably exceed the minimum required space to safely play and enjoy pickleball.

In the court assessment link, it appears Walter Reed basketball court meets the "5" factor, as there's a counting error. Also, one could make the case that it meets a "6" factor, as the first factor is met at well, there's three courts on the basketball court. Additionally, the pause proposal results in a reduction of courts from the current 9 to 4 at most. Putting a reservation system in place would also reduce the availability of courts because of inefficiency inherent in administrative processes. The current arrangement meets the need at most times, and would benefit from additional, not fewer, courts. If the County is proposing the pause criteria to reduce use and participation at Walter Reed, it should provide a substitute location that has at least 9 courts. Suggestions include, Bluemont. tennis courts, Thomas Jefferson tennis courts, or developing currently undeveloped sites, such as the acquired land at the former Virginia Hospital site on Carlin Springs Rd, Minor Hill Park, or other available space which the Planning Office must new aware.

The initial premise of SIX courts is off-the-mark. I think a re-plan is in order --but not if you reduce the number of courts while you are re-planning. It was a hostile move to put metal barriers across the Old Glebe basketball courts (available for limited hours for pickleball) right after the county agreed to some "pilot plan" limited hours. Then, you locked WR courts on Sunday mornings until 1pm. What other public fields or parks are locked off from use on Sunday mornings?? I understand that some residents near the courts have complained about the noise of the balls and paddles -- put up noise barriers. Why do you think that resurfacing six courts at WR when nine courts are already in full-time use is responding to the needs of the multi-age, diverse pickleball community?

Or, let's find another venue for a pickleball center---but don't close off pickleball courts while we are doing that.

I was unable to locate any information on when the pickleball courts would be closed to defer to activities at the Center for which the parking and access are needed such as voting days, expos, etc. I would hate to see individuals discouraged from voting or taking part in a community event because they were unable to park at the Center or were otherwise intimidated by the sheer number of pickleball players and watchers congregating on the walkways and parking spots (when they stand there to save a space of their soon-to-arrive teammate). I would also suggest setting firm times for court availability so that we don't have excessive hours of activity (see comment in the Project Pause section re sunrise start time). This would also alleviate any potential arguments about these early morning games if everyone was on the same page and residents could count on some quiet time in the morning and evening to enjoy the outdoors or just have their windows open for fresh air. The road noises are one thing as you understand will be a constant factor when you move into this neighborhood, but this pickleball noise is a factor no one anticipated. I am very interested to see if the County polls the current players to determine how far they are coming from in order to play at this Center and what options are nearer to them that they would rather not have changed to accommodate their current obsession with this sport. I get the feeling that many in my neighborhood do not play pickleball (as I think only 14 percent of Americans do) and do not want to see this turn into another "missing middle" "NIMBY" issue.





Which gender do you most identify with?








Which neighborhood do you live in?






Which of the following best describes your current home?








Do you rent or own your current home?










Which of the following best describes your current home?









Which neighborhood do you live in?
