





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Prioritize space for

	resting, eating, and relaxing	and money is better spent elsewhere	and screened areas
Summary	A core theme heard from respondents was the desire for this park to become a space for rest, relaxation, and small gatherings. Potential uses suggested were quick snacks, taking food from a nearby restaurant and eating, small gatherings with friends, or resting after shopping in the area.	Over a dozen commenters indicated their belief that they do not think of this space as a park and worry about the money being spent on its renovation. The common sentiment among these comments was to spend the money on other County projects, or to plant trees and add green space to	Respondents noted the need for shade- covered furniture so that users can enjoy the space hotter months. Between tree cover, shade structures and screens, commenters hope the space can accommodate



Theme	Restaurant Row Park	23 rd Street Park / 23 rd Street Plaza	Keep the current name	Firehouse Park / Volunteer Firemen's Park	Zavarella Music Park
Summary	Community members' most common suggestion was "Restaurant Row" to call out the park's proximity to numerous local restaurants and its most common use.	Another common response was either 23rd Street Park or 23rd Street Plaza. Commenters noted these options simplify the current name of "23rd Street South and South Eads Street Park" while still signifying where it sits geographically.	A few comments asked that the current name remain the same, as it specifies exactly where the park sits and avoids a lengthy or costly renaming process.	A couple of community members asked that the park be renamed to signify the location of the old volunteer fire house that served the area for many years.	Another suggestion was (Tony) Zavarella Music Park to reflect an old music store that sat on the corner of 23 rd Street South and South Eads Street. The store was a fixture in the local community.

Did we miss anything?

Below are the top themes that we heard from the open-ended comments in descending order of relevant comments.

Theme	Not a park, waste of money	Signage and educational materials	Seating options with back support	Lighting alternatives	Accessibility
Summary	A dozen respondents reiterated their perspective that this space does not constitute a "park," and other projects within the County should take priority.	A few commenters were not aware that this site is considered an official DPR park. They suggested treating the park as the entryway to the 23rd Street Business District with signage. One comment requested a new Aurora Hills sign as well.	A couple of community members stated that specialized benches can be uncomfortable to sit on for more than a few minutes. They requested that all benches have back support to encourage use for long periods of time.	Two comments asked the project to consider integrated lighting in the seating at the park, rather than festoon or hung lights. This could help improve lighting without contributing to light pollution.	Between the site's current condition and the draft concepts, a community member requested that accessibility be further considered to ensure equal access and use of the park.




