




#### Consider Your Housing Affordable

Q12. In general, considering all the costs it takes to live in your home - including monthly rent or mortgage payments, plus taxes and utilities - do you consider it affordable?






# Consider Affordable by Income Spent





#### Likelihood of Moving Out of Arlington Because of Housing Costs



# RENTERS: Forced to Move Because of Cost


- Q17. Do you think it is likely in the next five years or so, your rent will increase so much it will force you to move?






## RENTERS: Desire & Expectation of Home Ownership in Arlington








## OWNERS: Desire to Stay v. Move / If Stay, Modifications to Home Needed

- Q16. Do you think your home will need some physical modifications to allow you to remain living there the rest of your life or not?



#### Volunteered Top Reason to Live in Arlington





### Evaluation of Arlington's Affordable Units to Renters <60% AMI


Q32. Experts who have studied Arlington housing say that roughly one-in-four or 25 percent of Arlington apartments are considered affordable to people earning what is considered a low income in Northern Virginia - that is defined as up to \$65,000 a year for a family income and up to 45 thousand for singles. In your opinion, does Arlington have too few, too many or about the right amount of rental housing affordable to households with these incomes?


