SUBJECT: Year-End Report 2008

Dear Board Members:

The following summarizes the Planning Commission's efforts for 2008. Established in 1956, the Arlington County Planning Commission is a citizen advisory board authorized by the Virginia State Code to promote the orderly development of the locality and its environs by advising the Arlington County Board on land use matters.

The Commission, currently comprised of 12 members, changed its composition in 2008 with two new appointments, one reappointment, and one resignation. Terry Serie was appointed in February to a term ending on February 28, 2012, and Steve Cole was appointed in September to a term ending on September 30, 2012. Peter Fallon was reappointed to a term ending on October 31, 2012. Lisa Chávez resigned as of December 1.

Officers:

In January 2008, Nancy Hunt was elected Chair and Peter Fallon was elected Vice Chair of the Planning Commission. They served in those capacities throughout the year.

Public Hearings:

In 2008, the Planning Commission held 11 public hearings and considered the following (some items were considered more than once as a result of deferrals):

- 12 General Land Use Plan Amendment requests,
- 4 Master Transportation Plan Amendments,
- 1 Other Comprehensive Plan Amendment,
- 3 Sector Plan items,
- 11 Zoning Ordinance Amendments,
- 2 Form Based Code Amendments,
- 7 Rezoning requests,
- 1 Historic Designation,
- 1 Blight Designation,
- 17 Vacation of streets/public right-of-way requests,
- 3 Neighborhood Conservation Plans,
- 5 Use Permit requests,
- 1 Phased Development Site Plan,
- 9 Site Plans or Site Plan Amendments,
- 1 Form Based Code Concept Plan, and
- 1 Policy Framework and Illustrative Concept Plan.

Among these items, the Commission considered three modal elements of the Master Transportation Plan (Bicycle, Pedestrian, and Transportation Demand Management/Transportation Systems Management), policies on Transfers of Development Rights and "consideration of general land use plan amendments unanticipated by previous planning efforts", the Capital Improvement Program 2009-2014, a historic district designation for Swanson Middle School, a blight designation for a partially constructed building, and a policy framework and illustrative concept plan for Crystal City. The Commission received staff briefings on planning-related activities, including the Affordable Housing Ordinance and policies for its use in land use requests, the stormwater funding proposal, an overview of the Wakefield High School concept options, LEED policy for site plans, and public art. Some of these items were subsequently considered by the Commission as action items.

In 2008, the Planning Commission reviewed, and the County Board subsequently approved, approximately:

- 1.533,686 square feet of office development,
- 1,501 residential units, and
- 146.278 square feet of retail development.

In 2008, the Planning Commission reviewed two additional major use permit proposals that were approved by the County Board—a new Arlington Mill community center combined with a residential and retail mixed use project, and a 36-unit affordable housing project. A third use permit, for two units that was part of the 2201 Pershing Drive site plan, is listed with the site plans above.

No site plans, use permits, or other major items were deferred from hearings in 2008 to be heard by the Planning Commission in early 2009.

Planning Commission's Committees:

The Site Plan Review Committee (SPRC), chaired by Charles Monfort, held 26 meetings. In addition to site plans, meetings were held under the auspices of SPRC to review the Arlington Mill Community Center, a Form Based Code/public facility use permit; to review the Potomac Yard Center Park landscape plan; and to discuss changes to Administrative Regulation 4.1 and updates to the standard site plan conditions. Either one or two items were reviewed at each SPRC meeting. Site Plans that are currently under review but which had not been considered by the Planning Commission by December 31, 2008 include 3 Metropolitan Park and 2009 14th Street (Executive office building site). At year end, several site plans are still in the preliminary stages of review or filing, including: the Courthouse Landmark Tower and American Service Center - these plans have been accepted but SPRC review has not yet begun; and 2145 Lee Highway (Bergman's site). Fairmont/Arlington Gateway major amendment, and 650 N. Glebe Rd. (Goodyear site) - these plans are in the preliminary filing stage and have not been accepted.

The Long Range Planning Committee (LRPC), chaired by Terry Savela, held six meetings during the year. Three meetings each were devoted to Crystal City planning-related items and Fort Myer Heights North, two meetings covered Master Transportation Plan elements, and one included the GLUP amendment policy. In addition, a significant planning effort is underway for the East Falls Church Metro Station Area, and another is beginning on Columbia Pike.

The Zoning Ordinance Committee (ZOCO), chaired by Peter Fallon, held 11 meetings during 2008. Agenda items focused on a variety of proposed zoning ordinance amendments and informational items, to allow retail uses in "RA4.8", to permit accessory dwellings, implementation of the Clarendon Sector Plan, fees, Form Based Code amendments, kiosks, wayfinding, implementation of the Fort Myer Heights North Plan, height and density associated with Transfers of Development Rights in Rosslyn, nonconforming use related to acquisition of property for public use, window transparency, BZA use permits, and civil penalties. An additional item was development of a formal Unified Commercial/Mixed Use Development (UC/MUD) process.

Public Facilities Review Committee (PFRC): In late 2007, the County Board established a Public Facilities Review Committee (PFRC), modeled after the Site Plan Review Committee, to review proposed public facility projects. The Board appointed Inta Malis PFRC chair, and Brian Harner and Charles Monfort as members. During 2008 the PFRC held three administrative/training meetings, five meetings of its civic architecture working group, four meetings to review the Wakefield High School concept plans, one in combination with the Building Level Planning Committee for Wakefield, and one meeting to review Wakefield High School schematic drawings.

Planning Commission's Representation on Other Committees:

Individual Planning Commissioners have volunteered their time, provided valuable input, and represented the Planning Commission on various groups. In particular, Commission members contributed planning efforts and time to the Crystal City Task Force, Schools planning processes, the Arlington Mill Community Center redevelopment, and East Falls Church planning. The attached list provides the Commissions and Committees on which Planning Commissioners served.

Beyond their participation in organized committees and task forces, Planning Commissioners have provided advice and consultation on planning issues of particular interest to them individually, including Commissioner Ciotti's work promoting ADA compliance and universal accessibility in new projects and Commissioner Pebley's participation in emergency preparedness and public safety planning issues. The County Board benefits from having a dedicated group of Planning Commissioners whose individual and collective priorities include environmental sustainability, affordable housing, historic preservation, neighborhood protection, and architectural excellence.

For reference and public record purposes, the Commission's web page www.arlingtonva.us/plancom includes all of the meeting minutes, recommendation letters and other information for the Commission's 2008 endeavors. The Planning Commission has been working hard to improve its use of its website for publicizing meeting schedules and providing documents and other timely information.

The Planning Commission would also like to express its appreciation for the support provided by all of the County's staff who are involved in the planning process. Staff from many different departments work with each other and with the Planning Commission to provide the high caliber of planning for which Arlington is renowned. In particular, the Planning Commission works closely with the staff of DCPHD. The staff's professionalism and dedication to good planning has been instrumental in educating and assisting the Planning Commission on the recommendations made to the County Board. The Planning Commission is especially indebted to Lisa Maher, the Planning Commission Coordinator, for her invaluable support. She brings both dedication and a high level of expertise to the position. The Planning Commission also notes the recent staff turnover in both DCPHD and DES and the hiring of new staff. The Commission expects that the new and relatively inexperienced staffers will, with appropriate training, soon be able to provide the level of support that will assure that Arlington continues to be a model community for planning.

On behalf of all members of the Planning Commission, I want to thank the Arlington County Board for the opportunity to serve Arlington County. We faced a number of challenges in 2008 and worked hard to turn those challenges into opportunities to recommend innovative planning solutions to the County Board. We look forward to the challenges and opportunities that 2009 is sure to present.
